Education Beyond "Self": Rejuvenating the True Spirit of Visakha Vidyalaya

If Visakha Vidyalaya seeks to maintain the identity upon which it was founded, the tone of the education it imparts must conform to a primary tenet of Buddhist philosophy: shedding of 'self'. This requires looking beyond oneself towards a diverse and evolving world. However, caught in the competitive rat-race that education has sadly become, we need to produce more civic conscious women citizens who are accountable to all equal aspects of our social organism: humans, animals and the environment. I hope that the following observations provoke some thought, if not action, to rejuvenate the true spirit of our alma mater.

We learn the science involved in climate change and yet remain undirected to make genuine personal sacrifices to prevent global warming. We are trained to worship teachers within the precincts of the school and yet remain unlearned in the discipline of treating elders, the less able and animals with respect, compassion and care outside the school gates. We are compulsorily taught minority languages as part of the school curriculum and vet remain unprotected from extreme nationalism when exercising our vote or facing the prospect of our children entering into inter-cultural relationships. These examples are attributive to a disconnection that has come about between principle and practise, one that is propelled by fear, suspicion and denial of the outside world. Yet, such resistance to societal changes, other cultures which include values of

minorities in our own country or the west and unconventional choices, some of which may not appeal to a limited or false sense of self, runs contrary to the very core of Buddhism

In fact, if you wish to effectively challenge what you see as a negative socio-cultural phenomenon, it is wise to first acquire knowledge in that culture. For instance, when the Empire writes back in postcolonial times, it writes back most successfully in English itself. That is the edge that education in the social sciences gives you. Yes, scientific and technological advancement will equip you to develop and make more convenient your "living conditions"; but it does not teach you social skills in "life". Subjects such as history, politics, languages, literature, music and art open up an array of new worlds which allow you to experience and perhaps even appreciate the "other" as well as challenge it if necessary. It is paramount to acknowledge that a wholesome quality of life is dependent upon the physical pleasure of fulfilling human needs which is achieved by scientific progress and the mental joy of performing humane duties which is inculcated through learning in the arts and humanities. I do not intend to elevate one discipline over the other, but only wish to highlight that the latter offers an opportunity to create the attitudinal change that is necessary to see beyond a selfish lens.

The present culture of national education is under threat of becoming increasingly insular and intolerant. serving one's own socio-cultural community only, as it attempts to clutch onto an illusive purity and a past that cannot be recreated. Transforming that trend into one of selflessness is the call of education in the future; what I see as the responsible response that Visakha Vidyalaya should generate as a leading Buddhist school in the country and its past, present and future students should exemplify as Sri Lankan citizens.

Her long association with Guiding is well known. She was the first Guide Commissioner of Ceylon.

In 1947 she took over as the Captain of the 11th Colombo Guide Company and was the first Asian to chair a world conference of Girl Guides in the year 1975.

It was at her request, during her tenure as Guide Commissioner that the words of the Girl Guide promise 'I promise to do my duty to God and my country' were changed to 'my religion and my country'.

Besides leaving her mark in the Guide movement she gave invaluable service to the Sarvodaya movement and is now the President of the Women's section of this. .

She was an unforgettable personality, as a student excelling in drama, as a kindergarten teacher and as an active OGA member and she would always be an example in the field of social service. May this good karma follow her on to the attainment of the Goal of Nirvana!
