Admission of daughters of Old Girls to VV

However uncomfortable it may be for most of us, an issue that some of us for long sought to ignore needs now be brought into the open.

It is the reluctance of many Visakhians, some of whom are second & even third generation Old Girls and some former Executive Committee Members, to admit their daughters to Visakha. This at a time when there is enormous competition in the admissions to our school which is acknowledged as the best in the land!

Loyalty to and pride in their alma mater of many of these Visakhians are unequivocal. Most of them never miss an OGA function nor fail to donate generously when the hat is passed around on behalf of the Association.

What then are the reasons for their opting to send their daughters to private schools rather than bequeathing the privilege of being Visakhians on their progeny? They are many none of them trivial and all worthy of digestion by all of us die hard Visakhians.

The competition at admission is cited as a major reason, although it is the view of many of us that how ever hard the admission process may be, the outcome is truly worth it.

The peer pressure, the competition, the constant striving for the best in achievement, all hall marks of Visakha are regarded detractors by them. Surely they say, each student has her own pace of learning, special skills & leanings which they believe are neither recognised supported at Visakha.

It has to be admitted that the individuality of persona is not one of the traits encouraged at our school. Conformity to a certain ideal is.

Perhaps a certain degree of lessening of pressure for achievement and the encouragement of a rounded personality of each and every student should be the needs of the day. This is not to woo every Old Girl to admit their daughters to Visakha, but to strengthen our belief that Visakha is the best in every sense imaginable.

Sita Rajasuriya Remembered

This is my personal appreciation of a much beloved and respected Girl Guide Captain of the 11th Colombo Girl Guides of Visakha

Mrs Rajasuriya arrived at Visakha with her two stalwart assistants Yaso Punchihewa & Rupa Gomes. The trio, all past Visakhians were to awaken a hibernating 11th Colombo Girl Guide Company and see it become one of the best amongst those in the Island.

We would gather in the shade of the magnificent Na tree which stood beside the netball court in those days. Planning meetings, establishing patrols, appointing patrol leaders and even having patrol badges embroidered were tasks embraced with enthusiasm. I do not remember a single meeting at which Mrs Rajasuriya was not present – always her charming self, wearing her sunny smile.

Visakha had the honour of having four Visakhians among the contingent of six to attend a World Jamboree in Narabun Australia a first for Sri Lanka. Needless to say Mrs Rajasuriya took on the responsibility accompanying this bevy of lively teenagers to the event ably assisted by Janet Vairakian. On a train journey to an evening campfire, two of our group unused to the automatic doors on the train, got over carried. Mrs Rajasuriya seeing us from the platform didn't appear to 'turn a hair'. After the first minutes of panic, we decided to disembark at the next stop. Having navigated ourselves to the opposite platform & travelled back to meet the rest of the group, we leapt off the train to be greeted by 'I knew you'd be sensible enough to know what to do'.

Much has been written about her services to the Girl Guide Movement where she rose to the highest office All Island Chief as Commissioner, and her subsequent work with Sarvodaya.

Sita Rajasuriya during her tenure took the Girl Guide movement to the rural areas & I believe tailored it to local needs. It appears that in that

- Pap smear every 3 yrs for cancer of cervix (mouth of the cervix)
- The Human Papilloma Vaccine (HPV) can prevent Cervical cancer
- Pelvic examination
- Breast Examination over age of 35 yrs
- Annual mammograms (over the age of 35 yrs). Particularly those at high risk eg family history
- Weight & Body Mass Index. A BMI > 24 kg/m²; indicates excessive weight & necessitates advice on diet & exercise
- Blood Pressure
- Cholesterol levels
- Blood sugar
- Thyroid levels

Those over 50 yrs (in addition to the above) –

- Management of menopausal symptoms
- Pelvic Examination, Blood test & Ultra Sound Scan for Ovarian cancer
- Stools for occult blood & Colonoscopy for colorectal cancer
